

## *Word list for “Der süße Brei”*

<p><i>Hallo!</i> I’m Sarah Riches, your child’s German teacher. This year we’ll be reading German fairy tales (in addition to the songs and games that we always do in my class). With each fairy tale the children learn a list of words and actions - the actions help to cement the meaning of the words without needing any English!</p> <p>A thoughtful parent suggested that I send home the words so that parents can have them on hand when their children want to show them what they learned.
